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
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1 Introduction

- The calling indicator will keep yellow when there's an incoming call.
- The two-way audio indicator will keep white when there's an ongoing two-way audio conversation.
- · The unlock indicator will keep blue when the door is opening.




Figure 2-1 Main Unit Appearance




Figure 2-2 Two-Wire Main Unit




Figure 2-3 Nametag Module Appearance




Figure 2-4 Keypad Module Appearance




Figure 2-5 Indicator Module




Figure 2-6 PMR Indicator Module




Figure 2-7 Card Reader Module




Figure 2-8 Display Module




Figure 2-9 Information Module




Figure 2-10 Touch-Display Module




Figure 3-1 Main Unit Terminals




Figure 3-2 Two-Wire Main Unit Terminal




Figure 3-3 Sub Module Terminal (Except Touch-Display Module)




Figure 3-4 Touch-Display Module

3.2.1 Door Lock Wiring




Figure 3-5 Door Lock Wiring



Terminal NC1/COM is set as default for accessing magnetic lock/ electric bolt; terminal NO2/COM is set as default for accessing electric strike.

3.2.2 Door Contact Wiring




Figure 3-6 Door Contact Wiring



AIN1 and AIN2 are defaulted to connect door contact. Door contact connected to AIN1 detects status of the lock that connected to NC1/NO1; Door contact connected to AIN2 detects the status of the lock connected to NC2/NO2.

3.2.3 Exit Button Wiring




Figure 3-7 Exit Button Wiring



AIN3 and AIN4 are set as default for connecting exit button. Exit button connected to AIN3 opens the lock connected to NC1/NO1; Exit button connected to AIN4 controls the lock that connected to NC2/NO2.

3.2.4 RS-485 Card Reader Wiring

To connect RS-485 card reader, refer to the picture below.




Figure 3-8 RS-485 Card Reader Wiring

4 Installation



- Make sure the device in the package is in good condition and all the assembly parts are included.
- Sub module must work along with the main unit.
- The PMR module is equipped with indicators so that it doesn't have to be used with indicator sub module.
- Set the sub module address before start the installation steps.
- · Make sure the place for surface mounting is flat.
- Make sure all the related equipment is power-off during the installation.
- Tools that you need to prepare for installation:
 Drill (ø6), cross screwdriver (PH1*150 mm), and gradienter.

4.1 Configure Sub Module Address

You need to set the sub module address via DIP switch before installation.

Steps

 Remove the rubber cover on the rear panel of the sub module to expose the DIP switch.




Figure 4-1 DIP Switch

Set the sub module address according to the DIP rules, and install the rubber cover back.

🔃 Note

- DIP 1, 2, 3, 4 are used to coding the sub module address. DIP 5, 6, 7, 8 are reserved.
- Valid sub module address is from 1 to 8. The address should be unique for connecting to the main unit.

4.2.1 Two-Module Surface Mounting




Figure 4-2 Mounting Frame



- The dimension of two-module mounting frame (W \times H \times D) is: 219 mm \times 107 mm \times 33 mm.
- The dimensions above are for reference only. The actual size can be slightly different from the theoretical dimension.

Steps

- Paste the installation Sticker 1 onto the wall. Make sure the sticker is placed horizontally via measuring with the gradienter.
- Drill 4 holes according to the screw holes on the sticker. The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 25 (depth) mm. The suggested length of cables left outside is 270 mm.




Figure 4-3 Drill Screw Holes

- Remove the sticker and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes.
- 4. Fix the mounting frame onto the wall with 4 expansion bolts.




Figure 4-4 Fix the Mounting Frame

5. Thread the module-connecting line across the thread hole of the frame. Pass the main unit connecting lines across the thread hole to the upper grid.




Figure 4-5 Placement of Lines

- 6. Connect the cables.
 - Connect the lines and module-connecting line to the corresponding interfaces of the main unit, then place the main unit into the upper grid.
 - Connect the other end of the module-connecting line to the input interface of the sub module.
 - Organize the cable with cable tie in the package. The suggested cable connection picture as shown below.




Figure 4-6 Line Connection Effect Picture

7. Insert the modules into the frame after wiring. The main unit must be placed in the top grid.




Figure 4-7 Insert the Modules

8. Use the hexagon wrench in the package to fix the cover onto the frame.




Figure 4-8 Fix the Cover




Figure 4-9 Gang Box



The dimension of two-module gang box is: 237 (W) \times 134 (H) \times 56 (D) mm. The dimension is for reference only.

Steps

1. Drill the installation hole, and pull the cable out.



- The suggested dimension of installation hole is 220 (H) × 108 (W) × 33 (D) mm.
- The suggested length of cables left outside is 270 mm.




Figure 4-10 Drill the Installation Hole

- 2. Select a cable entry and remove the plastic sheet.
- 3. Mark the gang box screw holes on the hole.
 - 1) Routs the cables through the gang box hole.
 - 2) Insert the gang box into the installation hole.
 - Mark the gang box screw holes' position with a marker, and take out the gang box.




Figure 4-11 Mark the Screw Holes

- 4. Drill 4 holes according to the marks on the wall, and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes. The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 45 (depth) mm.
- **5.** Fix the gang box with 4 expansion bolts.




Figure 4-12 Fix the Gang Box

6. Fill the gap between the gang box and the wall with concrete. Remove the mounting ears with tool after concrete is dry.




Figure 4-13 Remove the Mounting Ears

- 7. Connect cables and insert the modules.
 - Connect Cable 1 and one end of Cable 2 to the corresponding interfaces of the main unit, then insert the main unit into the upper grid.
 - 2) Connect the other end of Cable 2 to the input interface of the sub module. Insert it into the lower grid.




Figure 4-14 Connect Cables and Insert the Modules




Figure 4-15 Fix the Cover




Figure 4-16 Mounting Frame

Steps

- Paste the installation sticker 1 onto the wall. Make sure the sticker is placed horizontally via measuring with the gradienter.
- Drill 4 holes according to the screw holes on the sticker.The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 25 (depth) mm. The suggested length of cables left outside is 270 mm.




Figure 4-17 Drill Screw Holes

- **3.** Remove the sticker and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes.
- 4. Fix the mounting frame onto the wall with 4 expansion bolts.




Figure 4-18 Fix the Mounting Frame




Figure 4-19 Mounting Frame




Figure 4-20 Placement of Lines




Figure 4-21 Line Connection Effect Picture




Figure 4-22 Insert the Modules into the Frame





Figure 4-23 Fix the Cover




Figure 4-24 Gang Box

 Cave the installation hole, and pull the cable out. The suggested dimension of installation hole is 321.8(W)×108(H)×45.5(D) mm.
 The suggested length of cables left outside is 270 mm.

- 2. Select a cable entry and remove the plastic sheet.
- 3. Mark the gang box screw holes on the wall.
 - 1) Route the cables through the gang box hole.
 - 2) Insert the gang box into the installation hole.




Figure 4-26 Mark the Screw Holes

- **4.** Drill 4 holes according to marks on the wall, and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes. The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 45 (depth) mm.
- 5. Fix the gang box with 4 expansion bolts.




Figure 4-27 Fix the Gang Box

Fill the gap between the gang box and wall with concrete. Remove the mounting ears with tool after concrete is dry.




Figure 4-28 Remove the Mounting Ears

- 7. Connect cables and insert the modules.
 - Connect Cable 1 and one end of Cable 2 to the corresponding interfaces of the main unit, then insert the main unit into the upper grid.

- 2) Connect the other end of Cable 2 to the input interface of Sub Module 1. Connect one end of Cable 3 to the output interface of Sub Module 1 and insert it into the middle grid.
- 3) Connect the other end of Cable 3 to the input interface of Sub Module 2. Insert it into the bottom grid.




Figure 4-29 Connect Cables and Insert Modules

Fix the cover and the main unit with 2 socket head cap screws by using a hexagon wrench (supplied).




Figure 4-30 Fix the Cover




Figure 4-31 Mounting Frame



- It takes two three-module mounting frames. The dimension of three-module mounting frame (W × H × D) is: 321 mm × 107 mm × 33 mm.
- The dimensions above are for reference only. The actual size can be slightly different from the theoretical dimension.

Steps

- 1. Paste two Sticker 1 onto the wall. Make sure the stickers are placed horizontally via measuring with the gradienter.
- 2. Drill 8 holes according to the screw holes on the sticker.



- The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 25 (depth) mm.
- · The suggested length of cables left outside is 270 mm.
- 3. Pull out the cable through the cable hole of the left sticker.




Figure 4-32 Drill Screw Holes

- Remove the stickers and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes.
- **5.** Thread the module-connecting line (400 mm) and grounding line across the thread hole of both frames.




Figure 4-33 Place the Grounding Line and Module-Connecting

- · Take the 400 mm module-connecting line for this step.
- · The green-yellow line in the package is for grounding.
- 6. Fix the mounting frame onto the wall with 8 expansion bolts.





Figure 4-34 Fix the Mounting Frame

- 3) Organize the cable with cable tie in the package. The suggested cable connection picture as shown below.




Figure 4-36 Line Connection Effect Picture




Figure 4-37 Insert the Modules

Pull the grounding line out and fixed its two end to the screw on the cover.




Figure 4-38 Connect the Grounding Line to the Cover




Figure 4-39 Fix the Cover




Figure 4-40 Gang Box




Figure 4-41 Cave the Installation Hole




Figure 4-42 Connect Two Gang Boxes




Figure 4-44 Mark the Screw Holes

- 6. Drill 8 holes according to the marks on the wall, and insert the expansion sleeves into the screw holes. The suggested size of hole is 6 (diameter) × 45 (depth) mm.
- 7. Fix the gang boxes with 8 expansion bolts.




Figure 4-45 Fix the Gang Boxes

8. Fill the gap between the gang box and wall with concrete. Remove the mounting ears with tool after concrete is dry. Route the grounding line through the cable entries.




Figure 4-46 Remove the Mounting Ears




Figure 4-47 Install Mounting Frame




Figure 4-48 Cables Connection




Figure 4-49 Connect the Grounding Line to the Cover




Figure 4-50 Fix the Cover




Figure 6-9 FTP Settings




Figure 6-11 Audio Settings




Figure 6-17 Event Linkage




Figure 7-1 Add to the Client




Figure 7-9 FTP Settings




Figure 7-11 Audio Settings




Figure 7-24 Issue Card in Batch




Figure 7-25 Card Settings




Figure 8-4 Device Call

Wire Testing Standards

- When there are multiple cores in one parallel line, only one pair of closed cores are allowed to transmit signal. It is not allowed to use multiple pair of cores in one cable to transmit signal.
- When using parallel lines, it is suggested to use those with shielding layer. If dual core or multiple core parallel lines without shielding layer are routed, stability of signal transmission can be effected. You need to run a test before installation.
- Impedance of twist pair in network cable are over 42 $\Omega/100$ m, so network cable cannot transmit enough power to indoor station. Network cable is not allowed to use during installation.
- Strong electricity and weak electricity cannot be wired in the same route, they need to be wired separately and the distance should be more than 0.5 meter.

Device Installation

- Installation environment (temperature, moisture etc.) need to follow requirements in specification or power output can be effected.
- Power consumption of modular door station (main module and sub modules) should be less than 12W. Please reach local technical support if you are not sure about power consumption of each module. Door station should be connected to CH6 of the video/audio distributor. If modular door station is connected to any terminal of CH1 to CH5, up to 3 sub modules can be connected.
- Indoor station should be connected to any terminal of CH1 to CH5 of the video/audio distributor.
- Up to 15 video/audio distributor can be cascaded. If more distributors are needed, you should cascade network switch supporting 1000 Mbps. The whole 2-wire system can have up to 500 devices.
- · Power supply must be certified by Hikvision.
- Indoor station needs to use firmware released after October, 2019.
